Correspondence between Durant, Frères, and Dumas of Flaviac and the Maison Repelin, de Micheaux & Cie of Lyon - fabric merchants who bought raw materials in the United States.


Fourteen handwritten letters from February 1861 to November 1862 with various references to the Civil War and its effect on their business. A dozen measure 26.5×21.5 cm. and two are 21.5×13.5 cm. General light wear, a few slight tears here and there, but overall in excellent shape. Near Fine.

An important letter from Lyon dated March 20, 1861 references Lincoln's famed first inaugural speech in which he denounced the secessionist ambitions as anarchical, but concluded with a heartfelt appeal for unity(his legendary "bonds of affection...mystic chords of memory," and so forth):

"... calm is now reappearing in our place, but the news in America isn't good, our manufacturers have returned to their previous reluctance; we will not be able to obtain today the prices of which we spoke to you...The speech of President Lincoln does not change the opinion that we had...the question remains as undecided as in the past, and American correspondence expresses the opinion that the Southern States will maintain their separation; It is therefore an armed conflict that is inevitably preparing..."

An intriguing collection of historical documents from a cataclysmically transformative time.



The book opens with two dedications to Madeleine Fabry, wife of Chancellor Pierre Séguier - one by Jean Ballesdens, Séguier's secretary and a great bibliophile, and the other by the printer Pierre Rocolet. Two of the fifteen plates bear the name of Balthasar Moncornet, a prolific Parisian painter, engraver, and print dealer, best known for his portraits of the nobility of the time. Christian maxims, spiritual exercises, the Little Office of the Blessed Virgin Mary, litanies, psalms, and prayers follow.

"The egg is a favorite Dalinian theme, given the duality of its hard exterior and soft interior. Venus...is divided into two parts, with an egg lying on the base created by the cut...the egg symbolizes life, renewal, the continuation of existence and the future...The clock slides down the neck giving us two opposing messages. Its presence symbolizes, on one hand, the beauty of the flesh as temporary and destined to fade, and on the other, the beauty of art as eternal, and not bound by the passage of time.

The characteristic Dalinian symbol of time is one of the protagonists of this sculpture."(Dali Universe)



An iconic work of philosophy and literature.

First edition, first printing. Original publisher's wrappers. In April 1942, 4400 copies were produced with varied imprints - 400 service de presse, 500 with no mention of edition, and 3500 with false mentions of editions from second through eighth. This copy bears the false fifth edition imprint.

Spine toned and chipped with some spotting, cover edges moderately worn, pages browned per usual, overall a Very Good copy. Rare in wrappers.

'The Stranger was completed as Camus worked during the day in a dingy hotel room in Paris, while in the evenings, he worked for a newspaper. It was a time of loneliness and tumult. As the war raged on, Camus moved from Paris to Oran in Algeria...With the Nazis' growing stranglehold over all French institutions, paper production was strictly regulated and censorship was in place. That Camus's book was published appears nothing short of miraculous...In the end, the Nazi head of propaganda in France, who had the final say in all publication matters, assented to *The Stranger*, as it was "asocial and apolitical." (Kumar)




With the publication of *The Stranger* and *The Myth of Sisyphus* in the same year, Camus became a public figure and an existential legend.(Haven)

A once-in-a-lifetime signed copy

A Week on the Concord and Merrimack Rivers

Henry David Thoreau Boston, 1849



First edition, first printing of his first book - a mystical work that was most personal to him. Rebound in turn of the century cloth, covers and spine moderately rubbed and scratched, retaining the original cream endpapers with a portrait of Thoreau pasted on a subsequent one. Overall, a Very Good copy chemised in a beautiful blue quarter-morocco case.

Signed by Thoreau on the front endpaper, along with a couple of handwritten corrections to the text in his hand! This copy was for his friend Theo Brown, a local tailor who also signed his name on the verso of the endpaper. It is identified in a surviving letter from Brown to Thoreau on January 10, 1862 wherein Brown asks Thoreau for two signed copies of A Week on the Concord and Merrimack Rivers.



"In the back window of Theo. Brown's tailoring shop, corner of Main and Pearl Streets, where many a hard fought battle of chess had been won and lost, anon was wont to sit the philosopher Thoreau, fashioning the habiliments of the soul, while near him Theo would calmly continue cutting out habiliments for the wear of the body, and Harry Blake, with his eyes glistening with delight behind his gold-bowed glasses, would follow the arguments of each." (Walden.org)

This copy was once owned by Brown's grandson, Theo III. Two of his diary entries reference it.

7/10/48:

"Elise and I drove to Concord this morning to attend the annual meeting of the Thoreau Society...Showed the daguerrotype I have of Thoreau [and] also my 1st edition with Thoreau autograph of [A] Week on the Concord & Merrimac[k] Rivers."

The following entry also physically describes this copy. Theo III had sent it for examination to the famed Thoreau collector, Albert Lownes.

8/20/48:

'I've had several interesting letters from Albert E. Lownes...about my copy of the "[A] Week on the Concord & Merrimack Rivers"...I sent him my copy and he wrote Aug 19:

"A Week came this morning and I took the first opportunity to examine it carefully. It is a most interesting copy and I congratulate you on owning it. Sometime in the past it must have been rebound. The original yellow or cream colored end papers have been retained, but the leaf bearing Thoreau's portrait has been added. It is quite different in quality from [other copies of this] book -- a heavier laid paper. I compared your copy with 4 others. In my earlier letter I referred to the corrections which Thoreau sometimes made. You may be interested to know that on page 120 he changed the word "work" to "wash." Thank you again for allowing me to see this precious volume. --- With great gratitude I am

Sincerely Albert E. Lownes."

"In the late summer of 1839, Thoreau and his older brother John made a two-week boat-and-hiking trip from Concord, Massachusetts, to the White Mountains of New Hampshire. After John's sudden death in 1842, Thoreau began to prepare a memorial account of their excursion. He wrote two drafts of this story at Walden Pond, which he continued to revise and


expand until 1849, when he arranged for its publication at his own expense. The book's heterodoxy and apparent formlessness troubled its contemporary audience. Thoreau interweaves descriptions of natural phenomena, the rural landscape, and local characters with digressions on literature and philosophy, the Native American and Puritan histories of New England, the *Bhagavad Gita*, the imperfections of Christianity, and many other subjects. Modern readers, however, have come to see it as an appropriate predecessor to *Walden*, with Thoreau's story of a river journey depicting the early years of his spiritual and artistic growth."(Princeton)

Thoreau's books signed by him are beyond scarce. Just a few appear in the sales records, the most recent being 70 years ago. Truly a once-in-a-lifetime copy.



First edition, "service de presse" review copy, original wrappers. Pronounced foxing on front cover and first few leaves, small split to front lower joint, small chip to upper corner of front endpaper, usual textblock toning due to cheap paper stock, general wear mainly at the edges, uncut, binding solid. Overall, a sound, unread Good copy - other than two leaves from the first gathering, it's completely unopened.

Inscribed by Fanon on the front endpaper.

The legend died of leukemia at only 36, and his signed books are exceptionally scarce - I've only seen one other copy in the trade, and none appear in the sales records.

"Though just 27 at the time of its publication, the work displays incredible literacy in major intellectual trends of the time: psychoanalysis, existentialism, phenomenology, and dialectics, as well as, most prominently, the early Négritude movement and U.S. based critical race work in figures like Richard Wright. Modest in length, the book is notable for its enormous ambition, seeking to understand the foundations of anti-Black racism in the deepest recesses of consciousness and the social



world. The book is Fanon's major work on blackness. In fact, his focus shifts in the years following the publication of *Black Skin, White Masks,* moving away from blackness as a problem—perhaps the problem—of the modern world and toward a wider theory of the oppressed, colonialism, and revolutionary resistance to the reach of coloniality as a system."(Stanford Philosophy)



First edition of this rare collection of anarchist-revolutionary essays.

 15×10.8 cm., 78 pages. Original wrappers bound in mid- 20^{th} century full leather by the famed Alain Lobstein. A scratch to the label, textblock moderately browned, else Fine. An exceptionally rare survival with just two copies in WorldCat.

"Tkachev was the first to advance the program of a direct assault upon the government by an organized revolutionary minority, in preference to attempts at socialist propaganda among the masses or reliance on a general peasant uprising to be provoked by agitation...some of his fundamental concepts in the field of revolutionary strategy and tactics anticipate, in a striking fashion, Lenin's design for a revolution in Russia." (Karpovich)

During the student riots in St. Petersburg in the 1860s, Tkachev led a small radical group and was repeatedly arrested and sentenced to



imprisonment, but escaped abroad in 1873. Ideological disagreements with Marx and Engels, and with Russian revolutionary émigré circles, would leave him isolated. In the mid-1870s, he published the radical magazine *Nabat (Alarm Bell)*, which advocated the creation of secret revolutionary cells in Russia and sympathized with acts of terrorism. His ideas began to gain more traction – People's Will, a group influenced by him, assassinated Tsar Alexander II in 1881. Tkachev spent the last few years of his life in a

Parisian sanitarium, succumbing to cerebral palsy in 1886 at just 41 years old.





"The first widely accessible Latin translation of three of the four Confucian classics, The Daxue(The Great Learning), Lunyu(The Analects), and The Zhongyong(The Doctrine of the Mean), as well as a biographical sketch of Confucius...This seminal work was the culmination of a century of Jesuit attempts to translate and interpret the Confucian classics. The bulk of this collective work was composed in China under the leadership of the Sicilian Jesuit Prospero Intorcetta(1626-1696) in Guangzhou, where



twenty-four Jesuit missionaries, along with four Dominicans and a Franciscan, had been exiled in 1666 after the bitter confrontation between the Muslim astronomer Yang Guangxian(1597-1669) and Adam Schall von Bell(1591-1666). The final product was completed and heavily edited by Philippe Couplet(1623-1693), who presented it to Melchisédech Thévenot(1620-1692), librarian of Louis XIV, for publication with the Bibliothèque Royale."(Canaris)

A landmark civilizational introduction to Confucius, the most famous Chinese person in history and one of the world's most renowned philosophers.



First edition in English, first impression. Translated by the prolific Basil Creighton. Fine, original black cloth book with red top edge, Australian bookseller sticker on front pastedown, seemingly unread and even retains the publisher's laid-in ads. In the rare, intriguingly designed jacket that appears from time to time, but never like this one - a Fine, unsurpassably pristine copy housed in a custom case.

Hesse's classic, mystically philosophical text speaks to successive generations because it taps into our bone-deep yearning for something more fulfilling than the soul-draining banalities we're taught to appreciatively accept.

Reality is an especially active force in the rare book world, routinely crushing our dreams of attaining perfect copies of cherished works. Every



so often, copies like this stymie its woeful force and enable our dreams to come true.



The genesis of an American mythos

The Virginian: A Horseman of the Plains

Owen Wister New York, 1902

First edition, first printing. Illustrated plates by Arthur I. Keller. Fine, original tan cloth book with the rare jacket in tremendously satisfying shape - chipped at spine panel ends and corners, a few closed tears else a bright, Near Fine example that retains its visual dynamism. The few *Virginian*



jackets that occasionally surface typically look ravaged. Contemporary female owner signature on front endpaper dated June 1902, Boston. An excellent copy housed in a custom case.

In 1885, the Harvard educated Wister sought recuperation at a Wyoming ranch after suffering a nervous breakdown. He'd begin writing various pieces about the West, culminating in this 1902 magnum opus that he dedicated to his friend, President Theodore Roosevelt. It effectively created the Western genre we know today – a mysterious, chivalrous cowboy rides into the West, grapples with moral dilemmas, and encounters a schoolteacher love interest. It also contains classic genre features like horse-thievery, card playing, cattle driving, and a climactic gunfight that's the first "showdown" in fiction. Truly a landmark work that was the best-selling book in the country for two straight years, garnering Wister fame and fortune and etching a key mythos into the psyche of the nation.



Edith Wharton New York, 1911

First edition, first state("wearily" unbroken on page 135) of Wharton's highly lauded tragic novel of secret love set against a bleak New England winter. One of the first 2500 copies(top edge gilt) from an overall edition of 6000.

Publisher's red cloth in Fine condition with the crazy rare dust jacket - scattered chipping with a loss at the upper corner of the rear cover, toned, else Very Good. An unrepaired rarity housed in a custom case. No other unrepaired jackets appear in the sales records since the Truman presidency.




The legendary Wharton was the first woman to win a Pulitzer Prize for fiction. She would utilize her great literary talents to attack the character failings of the New York aristocracy she was a part of. *Ethan Frome* is a departure from that upper crust setting and was written during an emotionally turbulent time for her – living in a crumbling marriage with a flagrantly unfaithful husband as she sought solace in her own intense affair. Her real life grief and emotional distress would be channeled into this masterpiece, as great artists do with their pain. Finally in 1913, she was able to break free via divorce.

Ex-Rev. Addie Wyatt - a significant figure in the union, civil, and women's rights movements. One of *Time Magazine's* Twelve Women of the Year in 1976.

This magazine features anti-Vietnam war speeches by Dr. King, Dr. John C. Bennett, Dr. Henry Steel Commager, and Rabbi Abraham Heschel - members of Clergy and Laymen Concerned about Vietnam. In late 1965, Dr. King joined this organization of multi-faith leaders to oppose the war, one of the largest moral and geopolitical disasters in American history. King bravely risked his hard-earned reputation to oppose American involvement in the war.


The Diary of Antoine Roquentin[La Nausee, Nausea]

Jean-Paul Sartre London, 1949

First edition, first impression in English. An American edition more aptly titled, *Nausea*, was released in the same year using these British sheets. Another translation also titled, *Nausea*, would appear in the U.K. in 1962.

Publisher's cloth boards - bright covers and spine, spotting along textblock edges, first few leaves foxed otherwise internally clean. Very Good.

Unclipped dust jacket with light chips at some edges, spine a shade toned, light general wear. Overall a nice, Very Good example of the charismatic jacket.



The work follows the story of Antoine Roquentin, a loner young man who becomes increasingly nauseated by his own existence. 'The basic element that underlies the novel and Sartre's existentialism more generally is the matter of human freedom. At one part of the novel Roquentin says to himself, "I am free now. I do not have the slightest reason for living." Roquentin suffers by being confronted with his total freedom. He suffers from life's and the world's contingency, its randomness and superfluity, aspects that are all linked to the crucial aspect and matter of freedom.'(Boppert)

Edgar Allan Poe London, 1845

First English edition, comprised of American first printing sheets from the same year with a cancel title-page bearing a London imprint - the subsequent 1846 English edition used second printing sheets. There were perhaps 1500 copies of these first printing sheets with an unknown number sent overseas for this English edition - it's a noted rarity. No other copies in the sales records since the height of the second World War. I've seen only one copy in the trade, and its pages were so foxed that it could have had a place in a grotesque Poe story. An exceptionally scarce copy of an iconic book.


228 pp. and (4) pp. of advertisements. Late 19th century half-calf, browned title page repaired, another leaf with a tiny corner restoration, tear to last ad leaf repaired. Old owner signature in red pencil on title page. Minor sporadic smudges at the margins, otherwise the pages are quite clean. The text block is entirely untrimmed. Overall, a Very Good copy housed in a custom slipcase.

Ex-Vincent Starrett(1886-1974), signature on front endpaper - journalist, bibliophile, and author of detective novels.

With the character of C. Auguste Dupin, Poe popularized the modern detective genre. Dupin would be the model for subsequent characters like Sherlock Holmes. This volume contains the first appearance in book form of all three Dupin stories, *Murders in the Rue Morgue, The Mystery of Marie Rogêt*, and *The Purloined Letter*. Among other horror and suspense classics found herein are *The Gold-Bug* and *Fall of the House of Usher*.

Poe resides in literature's inner sanctum, and here is one of his landmark works - a most worthy addition to the collection, a joyful acquiescence to one's bibliomania.


The Open Society and Its Enemies

One of the 20th century's landmark political philosophy works - written during Popper's political exile in New Zealand. He arrived there in 1937 to escape the forces of National Socialism in Austria. Within, he launches a

vigorous attack on totalitarianism and defense of liberal democracy with core values rooted in scientific rationality and debate.

Fifth edition of the Swiss physician and polymath's universal encyclopedia, posthumously enlarged and edited by his son, Jakob. It's a compilation of thousands of extracts to produce a universal history that displays how humanity's good and evil natures affect everything.


And now, more on this item's most significant feature. Starting in the late Middle Ages as a means of theft prevention, books housed in libraries and monasteries would be fashioned with a chain and connected to a desk; books were still rather expensive productions. While a cover's chain hook sometimes survives, the chain itself rarely does. It viscerally evokes the learned, perhaps dreary, yet compelling ambiance of the old library or monastery from which it came, with images of robed scholars studiously hunched over the tome playing their part in progressing human knowledge. Aside from purely religious texts, this tome is just the sort of wide-ranging work that would keep such a scholar ponderously occupied. It is indeed pretty magical.



The Tale of the Love and Death of Cornet Christopher Rilke

Rainer Maria Rilke New York, 1932

First American edition and likely first English language edition. This and several other Rilke works were translated by Mary D. Herter Norton and issued by the famous surnamed publishing house she founded with her husband.

Spine ends bumped, spine a shade toned, else Near Fine. Contemporary owner signature on front free endpaper. Unclipped jacket chipped at spine ends, moderate sporadic stains, edge and general wear, else Very Good.

"This little prose-poem about a young soldier in the Austro-Turkish war of the early 1660's was written during a single night in 1899, when Rilke was twenty-three. It had a modest success when it first came out. But when it was republished in 1912, in a more popular format, it took Germany by storm, much to the author's amazement. The first edition was sold out within weeks; there was one new printing after another; soldiers on the front lines during the World War I carried the book in their knapsacks, along with, possibly, the Bible. By 1920 it had sold 200,000 copies – an astounding figure for that time – and by the late '50's over a million. An intensely romantic meditation on the nature of masculinity, it is the book by which, among German readers, Rilke was primarily known and loved." (Stephen Mitchell)

Ink rubbing taken from a famed 13th century stele, mounted on a hanging paper scroll fashioned with wooden rods. 227×106 cm. total size.

This highly detailed map of the visible cosmos was created between 1190 and 1193 by Huang Shang, scholar and tutor to the emperor's son. It was later engraved on a stone stele in 1247 by Wang Zhiyuan, from which this rubbing is taken. This stele, along with 3 other major Song Dynasty steles, is preserved in the Suzhou Confucian temple in the Jiangsu province.

Rubbings of this stele are rare and highly regulated as a preservation effort, this being only the third or fourth example on the market in the last fifty years.

The chart portrays the entire visible sky from central China on a polar projection. The outline of the Milky Way, 28 lunar lodges, 280 constellations, and some 1440 stars indicated by small dots and joined into groups by straight lines are all shown. Some larger stars like Sirius are shown as larger dots. It's one of the world's oldest complex astronomical charts. The text also details an Earth creation story, its elemental composition, and hourly and monthly timekeeping - a remarkable scientific, historical, artistic and cultural artifact.


